Nine people, five machines fall through ice at "HAWG" derby

No injuries reported

According to the Natrona County Sheriff's Department nine people driving across the reservoir fell through the ice at Pathfinder during the "HAWG" ice fishing derby Jan 24.

According to Sgt. John Harlin three Polaris RZRs and two ATVs were reported to have gone through the ice. The were no injuries and everyone either self-rescued or received help from other fishermen.

Harlin said that high winds and warmer temperatures the night of Jan. 23 caused a series of fissures and pressure ridges on the reservoir. These, in turn, formed areas of open water and thin ice that were hard to discern on Saturday when cloud cover made for flat out of the water as well. light. At least one of these pressure ridges was near the boat ramp and fish check-in station for the derby.

Saratoga resident Steve Fletcher was one of the people who fell victim to the open water when he crossed a pressure ridge on his way to weigh in a fish and his Polaris RZR sank in approximately 120 feet of water. Fletcher said he and a friend were driving over rough ice, at approximately 10 miles per hour, when they spotted a small area of open water ahead of them but were unable to stop before the UTV fell through.

Fletcher said they were surprised by the open water as the area where they were had gone through the ice in the same general area.

2" or less - STAY OFF

4" - Ice fishing/activities on foot

5" - Snowmobile or ATV

8" - 12" - Car or small pickup

12" - 15" - Medium truck

According to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources general ice thickness guidelines for new, clear ice state four-inches of ice is safe for ice-fishing and other activities on foot, five-inches of ice is safe for snowmobiles and ATVs and eight-to twelve-inches of ice is safe for cars or small pickup trucks.

White ice or "snow ice" is only about half as strong as new clear ice. Double the above thickness guidelines when traveling on white ice.

Jeff Fleischman, a board member for the Pathfinder Boat and Fishing Club and a "HAWG" derby volunteer, said the open water on the reservoir during this year's derby was an anomaly and, "Obviously had we known there was any kind of danger we would have said that report on our website." Harlin related the story of two people who went through the ice on Pathfinder in a Polaris RZR that had net doors and a half-windshield. The operator and his passenger were unable to open the net doors and had to swim through the half-windshield in order to avoid drowning.

Harlin said, "Have an emergency plan if that vehicle goes into the water: no seat belts, no locking doors, have a plan for how to get out of it."

Few people attend Platte River Basin meeting Jan. 17

Water in Wyoming is inarguably one of the most important natural resources, so it was disappointing that only a handful of people attended the open house for (Plan) Jan. 27.

of three to be held to let the public know the progress of the Plan was held at the Saratoga/Encampment/Rawlins Conservation District (SERCD) board room with representatives from the Wyoming Water Development Commission (WWDC), WENCK Associates, the Wyoming State Engineer's Office (SEO) and Anderson Consulting Engineers Inc.,

Jodie Pavlica, the project manager for the WWDC, said the River Basin Planning was developed when the state legislature set aside money in 1999 with the intent of having a water resources inventory for the state of Wyoming.

The first time a Platte River Basin Planning study was done was in 2006, Pavlica said.

Inventory research

The study is intended to find how much water the state has, where it is being used and where there are surpluses and shortages, Pavlica said.

This year, an analysis for recreation and environmenstudy.

The results of the study will help the state, along with entities like SERCD, manage the water.

"This study is intended to be an update (to the 2006 study)," Pavlica said.

The WWDC acquires information from the SEO to calculate the specific use of water for irrigated lands and from municipalities to see the use of water per capita.

The WWDC does their own survey from 50,000 feet in the air which is used to determine where irrigation takes place and where it doesn't.

> Pavlica said the basin plan is a very open process. "We have built a level of trust with the community. We are not the new kids on the block and it certainly is an open process," Pavlica said.

> Any person can ask any question or make a comment at any time, she added... "That is why we are out here, the guy on the ground knows better what is going on in his area than we do, so we encourage (the input)."

> The project, which is slated be completed June 30, 2016, will publish results on their website.

The third task is to plan projects to solve problems and assist in applying for the funding of that project.

"We identify water resource-related issues in the inventory phase and then come up with project to help solve those problems in the plan," Schug said.

Anderson consulting can help ranchers assess and design solutions for problematic headgates and projects for spring improvements according to Schug.

Once the design is completed, they can guide the applicant in the application for state funding.


Grant money can be put into the hands of the individual through the conservation district for funding from the state.

The program is becoming more popular, Schug said.



County to hold public meeting on Hazard Mitigation Plan in Baggs

Carbon County is updating the Hazard Mitigation Plan. Barb Beck of Beck Consulting and Carbon County **Emergency Management Co**ordinator John Zeiger will be holding a public meeting at 2 p.m. Feb. 18 at the Baggs Town Hall.

"We need to think about natural hazards ahead of time ... We can't necessarily prevent natural disasters like wildfires or floods, but hopefully we can lessen the impacts and avoid loss of life when we do have a disaster," Zeiger said of the importance of updating the Hazard Mitigation Plan for Carbon County.

Under the guidance of the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC), Beck visited the county in November and December of last year to meet with the LEPC to inform citizens and the elected bodies of Rawlins and Saratoga on the updat-

ed plan. FEMA is funding the updated plan with a 25 percent county match. There will be no cost to the towns and city under the plan. The 10 incorporated communities and the county will be covered by the plan and will have the opportunity to adopt it when completed.

Beck and subcontractor AMEC Foster Wheeler are updating the history of disasters in the county as a basis of predicting future risk. The LEPC will be meeting at 9 a.m., Feb. 18 at the Jeffrey Center in Rawlins to refine upcoming goals and projects. The meeting is open to the public. With all three accidents apparently being the result of inexperience or overconfidence the Saratoga Sun is providing these basic safety tips.

An emergency incident occurred in which local search and rescue was sent to the Ryan Park area for a Colo. couple who had rented a snowmobile and sent out a SPOT satellite based distress call. Based on accounts from Carbon County Sheriff's office employees, the couple had gotten their snow machine stuck on a non-groomed trail and set off the SPOT transponder nine times before hiking out of the area. 
