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

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


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# Always looking to evolve

### Saratoga Skijoring to unveil new track for its 6th year

Hooves and skis are set to land in Saratoga this weekend as the 6th Annual Saratoga Skijoring Races will take place February 5 and 6 out at Buck Springs Arena.

While skijoring has become more popular in western states such as Wyoming, Colorado and Montana it has Norwegian roots. Derived from the word "ski driving", skijoring often used dogs to pull a skier. Once it arrived in the West, the dog was ditched in place of a horse and rider. Throw in an obstacle course built out of snow and now you have something to do during the long winter months.

Since it was introduced in Saratoga, both the Lions Club and the Saratoga Skijoring Committee have worked to keep things interesting for racers and spectators alike. This year, that comes in the form of a new course. In the past, the horse and rider would race down a dirt track while the skier would trail behind going through the snowy obstacle course.

"The biggest change that I think the spectators are going to see is, historically, we've always run on a dirt track offset to the right and we're doing a crossover track this year. So, the horses are going to be running snow and the skiers will go both to the right and the left of the horse in navigating the gates," said Will Faust, one of the event organizers and competitors. "We think, one, it makes it a little more entertaining to watch. Two, as a

"We're always looking to evolve," Faust said.

As of right now, the weather looks like it will cooperate, though the wind is always an issue in Wyoming. Saratoga Skijoring may have solved that problem, this year, though.
